But all of this—all the ups and downs and arounds—has made my time at Westview memorable and, for the most part, gratifying and often inspiring.

I consider myself greatly blessed to have been part of Westview's staff for so long, and I look forward to seeing you again from time to time as we continue our life adventures apart. May you be enriched by the Spirit that is "in and through and among us" — and by every member of this beloved community.

The ROUND PANTY

In the past month's Round Pantry *Westviewer* article it was mentioned that Food Pantries help with more than just alleviating hunger. Another major impact of providing food to those who are hungry comes in the connection of food insecurity and health.

What are the Connections Between Food Insecurity and Health?

The *Hunger in America 2014* study found that many households served by food banks include people coping with a diet-related chronic disease. Fifty-eight percent of households reported having at least one member with high blood pressure and 33 percent had at least one member with diabetes.

The cycle of food insecurity and chronic disease begins when an individual or family cannot afford enough nutritious food.... The combination of stress and poor nutrition can make disease management even more challenging. Further, the time and money needed to respond to these health conditions strains the household budget, leaving little money for essential nutrition and medical care. This causes the cycle to continue, increasing the risk of worsening existing conditions. Many families experiencing food insecurity often have several, if not all, compounding factors which makes maintaining good health extremely difficult. https://hunger-health-101/

The charitable food system is vital for food access for vulnerable people in nearly every community in the United States. The vast majority of individuals and families accessing food pantries and other charitable food programs are food insecure, meaning that there is a limited or uncertain availability of nutritionally adequate foods. Food insecurity is related to poor nutrition and many other negative health outcomes. Some of these health outcomes include poor physical, cognitive and socioemotional development among children and chronic health conditions, including diabetes, hypertension, and obesity, among adults. Poverty is the greatest threat to the healthy development of children and it comes with long-lasting, negative consequences. https://www.communitypsychology.com/foodbanks/

Thus, food banks are important in addressing community health disparities through the foods and related services that they provide (for example, The Round Pantry's partnership with Boulder County Health Department.) And, providing food for those in need is an important expression of our faith and mission.

The Rev. Dr. Diane Moffett, president and executive director of the Presbyterian Mission Agency, states "Fighting hunger and food insecurity is at the heart of our Presbyterian understanding of mission. Jesus fed the hungry and had strong judgment against nations whose people and systems provide no relief for people who are hungry, thirsty and pressed into poverty."

- * Especially needed are "heavy lifters" for various jobs:
 - Stacking boxes filled with non-perishable foods (40+ lbs.) on pallets (6ft. tall)
 - Setting up and taking down parking lot barricades, tall weighted traffic cones, sandwich board signs
 - Moving and moving and moving pallets of food products
- * SHOP (various tasks / do all or pick your preference(s) research pricing, place orders, pick up ordered food
- * Encourage others college students home for the summer, seasonal employees, retirees, people looking for a pleasant volunteer experience that fulfills their calling to "give back" to become ROUND PANTRY volunteers
- * AND, pray that our volunteer needs will be fulfilled as we continue on.
